

Affordable Resource Movement


Research the interest, needs, and feasibility of providing centralized support for open educational resources (OER) to Wisconsin libraries.



Where We Started

Stout Program

- OER as a means to reduce cost and choice
- Phase I funded by a UW System grant
 - Joined the Open Textbook Network
 - Held an inaugural workshop
 - Supported four OER adoptions
- Initial efforts have saved about \$95,000
- Have been used in 21 classes to date





What is an Open Textbook?

Students in courses with OER performed as well or better than students using traditional textbooks

OER and Student Learning

Academic Success

The study found that, subject to the limitations discussed, students who use OER perform significantly better on the course throughput rate than their peers who use traditional textbooks, in both face-to-face and online courses that use OER. This suggests that OER are a promising avenue for reducing the costs of higher education while increasing academic success.



UWM Open Textbook Impact Study: Psychology 101

Barth, Reddy, Fleming, Stoiber and Kienzler, 2016

- Most students used the free online version of the open textbook
- Students engaged with course content earlier
- Fewer attempts to earn a satisfactory quiz grade
- Better overall performance— average course grade improved by 4 points





The following learning resources and exercises will guide you through a research process and help you to explore a variety of information sources. This research process can be used to identify information sources for a variety of speech types. For best results, use your current speech assignment as the topic for each of the recommended learning exercises. Your instructor may assign a specific forum in which to share your work from each activity (in-class activities and discussions, D2L discussion posts, or D2L Dropbox reflections.) CVTC Library & Technology Services

Success using OER/related has been seen at course and program level

- Physics (course)
 - Approached through the lens of open education (OpenStax)
 - Savings of \$143,750 over 5 years
- Library & Information Services
 - Approached the lens of affordability (library and open education)
 - Savings of \$40,800 each cohort or \$1360 each student (average price \$80/textbook)
 - Success rate is highest of any online program at the College by 13%
- Organizational Leadership \$153,600 over 4 years or \$320/student
- Professional Communications \$28,000/cohort over 2 years or \$240/student per cohort
