### [Transom.org](#)

Transom channels new work, voices, and ideas into public media through the Internet and workshops. Our goal is to be useful and inspiring. Transom is a performance space, an open editorial session, an audition stage, a library, and a hangout. Our purpose is to pass the baton of mission and good practice in public media through tools, philosophy, and technique.

### [OHMS](#)

OHMS (Oral History Metadata Synchronizer) is a web-based system created by the Louis B. Nunn Center for Oral History (University of Kentucky Libraries) to inexpensively and efficiently enhance access to oral history online. OHMS provides users word-level search capability and a time-correlated transcript or indexed interview connecting the textual search term to the corresponding moment in the recorded interview online.

Aviary is a new hosted platform that allows users to easily discover and navigate audiovisual content. Whether you are a researcher trying to find specific audiovisual resources for your work, an organization trying to enhance discoverability of your collections, or a user who wants to watch content online, Aviary offers advanced tools to display, describe, and search audio and video.
